Learn about QC history, and its future, in film

The theme of our Nov. 5 meeting is the Quad Cities in film – past, present and future – and our guest speaker, **J. Douglas (Doug) Miller** has spent a lifetime becoming an expert it all.

A native of the Quad Cities, Doug spent a 50-year career in the entertainment field. In high school and college, he started as an usher and production assistant and learned how to manage all sorts of events, including Broadway road shows.

In the U.S. Army in Vietnam he was the production coordinator for the Bob Hope Christmas Show in Da Nang. After college, he worked in radio and TV, rising from production assistant to director of community relations and development. He left broadcasting 25 years ago to produce, promote and distribute motion pictures.

Doug now works for the Davenport Community School District as a planning consultant for the Creative Arts Academy of the Quad Cities. He is also the producer of the multimedia production of "Red Hot Jazz" for Western Illinois University.

Planning for the city's future...

For some four months, RDG Planning & Design has been working with Bettendorf leaders and citizens, through a series of public meetings, to develop a comprehensive 10-plus-year plan for the city. At the Oct. 29 meeting we heard a progress report on that effort from **Lauren Ditzler** of the city staff.

Those public meetings, which have attracted input from a cross-section of about 500 residents, Lauren said, have resulted in shared visions for priorities, including:

- → Revitalization of the city's downtown and riverfront.
- →Attracting more businesses and jobs
- →Improving city streets and streetscapes

- → Building more quality housing in the \$150-250,000 range to attract more young families
- →Planned growth as the population rises from 33,000 in the 2010 census to an expected 43,000 or more over 20 years →More cultural and recreational

→ More cultural and recreational opportunities

The plans that will emerge from this process will comprehensively deal with transportation, housing, street and utility infrastructure, land use, education...

During Q&A after Lauren's presentation, one key dilemma emerged: with high land costs in Bettendorf, it is very difficult to build single-family houses in a moderate price range. One suggestion to address that issue was the building of multi-story condos with ease of access to shopping and amenities.



Opportunity to learn more about Rotary Foundation

Rotary Foundation Minute for the Week of Oct. 27

In an effort to promote global development and volunteer service, last May, Rotary and the Peace Corps agreed to participate in a one-year pilot program in the Philippines, Thailand, and Togo. Under the agreement, Rotary clubs and Peace Corps volunteers are encouraged to share their resources and knowledge to boost the impact of development projects in these three countries.

Opportunities for collaboration include supporting community projects, training, networking, and community education. Both organizations are committed to improving lives and building stronger communities by addressing the root causes of violence and conflict, such as poverty, illiteracy, disease, and lack of access to clean water and sanitation.

The two organizations also agreed to explore expanding the collaboration to more countries based on the results of the pilot. Rotary will enlist the support of its members in recruiting Peace Corps volunteers and involving returned Peace Corps volunteers in service projects at home.

For example, in Togo, two Peace Corps volunteers teamed up with Rotary and other partners in the United States and Togo to distribute more than 5,000 soccer balls to disadvantaged youth. They are organizing 'More Than Just a Game' sessions, which use soccer as a medium to teach children about malaria prevention.

"It's just one example of how Rotary and Peace Corps can collaborate to achieve a lasting impact in the communities where they work."
