Adler Theatre to get new marquee: an update

Rick Palmer, executive director of the River Center Adler Theatre, is scheduled



to update us at the July 13 meeting on the latest developments in the evolution of the

Adler Theatre – work to install a new marquee.

The venue where the Quad-City Symphony plays half its concerts, where the Quad-City Ballet performs and where famous entertainers have performed opened in 1931 as the RKO Orpheum Theatre. Iowa’s largest movie house, it had 2,700 seats.

Over the years, several marquees have perched above the entrance. The current one was installed in 2010, replacing one that had been in place since 1997. At that time it was announced that a larger one would be installed “at a later date.”

**Inside stories on
Leadville 100**

Our own **John DeDoncker** and two running friends provided insights during the July 6 meeting into the grueling – and, admittedly, painful – **Leadville Trail 100-Mile Run**, which takes place each August on trails and dirt roads near Leadville, Colo. This will be John’s sixth time on the 50-mile-out-and-back course that takes runners up and down terrain between 9,200 and 12,620 feet in altitude.

John, John Byrne and Curt Johnston have been training for months to join some 800 other entrants who will step off at 4 a.m. Aug. 20. They’ll return to the start / finish line within 30 hours. Curt is running Leadville for the first time. The three friends – half of the planned QC contingent in the race – took turns describing aspects of the event.

In answering the central question – “Why run this race?” – John called it “the next great challenge” and answered a series of FAQs about what’s it’s like:

- “No, we’re not crazy” – it’s more about the journey, the training and living a healthy lifestyle to enable us to do this
- “No, we don’t do this in days” – it’s 30 hours straight, and “if you don’t make the markers on time, they’ll pull you out”
- “No, we don’t sleep” – but sometimes “zombie running” has occurred
- “No, it’s not toenail fungus – we’ve actually *lost* toenails”
- “Yes, we do eat while running – a lot” – not eating along the route will cause runners to lose energy and probably not finish, so they eat “whatever you can keep down”
- “Yes, we sign a waiver” – which acknowledges a long list of potential hazards ranging from heart failure to encountering a bear along the trail – “but no one has died yet”
- “Yes, we do... in the woods... like a bear,” John admitted.



John Byrne related some of the facts about the race itself:

- The largest ascent is about two-thirds of a mile
- Leadville was founded in 1983
- The race has a 30-hour time limit
- Racers encounter “all kinds of weather” from sun to snow
- Altitude averages 11,000 feet above sea level on “really rough” terrain that includes tree roots and big rocks

- Less than half of racers finish – runners aged 40-60-years-old have the highest finish rate
- All participants are experienced distance runners, and 25% are women

Curt detailed some of things runners do for about a year to prepare for Leadville:

- Long-distance runs – including back-to-back marathons on consecutive days
- Running up long stairs and hills
- Pre-dawn runs
- Learning all about their needs in hydration, nutrition, clothing and shoes

The QC runners are using Leadville to benefit two charities: HAVLife, which helps poor kids attend music and sports camps, and the foundation that aids the families of Navy SEALs.
