Meet the top chaplain in the First Army

A recent news story reported on development training of the First Army Unit Ministry Teams. In the October training, hosted by First Army Chaplain Col. Jeffrey Zust – our speaker at the Nov. 9 meeting – those team members "brainstormed to create a more streamlined training process that integrates active-duty, National Guard and Reserve soldiers," the report said.

The First Army uses those twice-yearly sessions to shape how they deliver spiritual support to soldiers and their families – while meeting the differing needs of regular active-duty, Reserve and Guard forces blended together.

German heritage abounds in QC

At the Nov. 2 meeting, **Kelly Lao**, executive director of the German-American Heritage Center in Davenport, provided insights into the contributions of Germans to every aspect of life in the Quad Cities.

To illustrate, she outlined the history of the GAHC building: Opened as a 3-story hotel in 1861 by Johann Friedrich Mueller (later changed to John Frederick Miller), the building contained 15 guest rooms and a ground-level store. To accommodate growing numbers of emigrating Germans, it later doubled in size and added a fourth story in 1878, she said. in the pre-World War I years, it served as a center of German culture and social life. The building gradually fell into disrepair and sat vacant for a time

until, in 1995, groups that wanted a place to display the city's German heritage bought it, renovated it and opened the center in 2009.

Many of the German émigrés who settled in Davenport and other QC towns beginning in mid-19th century came from Schleswig-Holstein (near the Danish border) because of civil strife there, she said. They brought with them many uniquely German institutions and businesses – zither bands, Turner (social) clubs, breweries and German-language newspapers. They also supported and participated in the arts – singing and



theatre groups; the forerunner of the Quad-City Symphony Orchestra began with an all-German board of directors (and played its first concert of all German composers, added **Harry Coin** during the Q&A session after Kelly's presentation). Modern landmarks – the Kol Ballroom, Schuetzen Park and Washington Square Park – all began as part of the German influence on Davenport culture, Kelly said. Much of the city's remaining 19th century architecture – downtown business and office buildings and the stately Gold Coast homes along the western bluffs – all have German origins.

World War I and Prohibition severely curtailed German influences, she said.

Anti-German war sentiment closed the German-language newspapers, ended the teaching of the language in the schools and broke up many of the social and cultural structures. Prohibition closed the breweries and shuttered the beer-halls. Iowa passed a law forbidding anyone to speak German in public.

Even in the face of all of those developments, Kelly point out that more Americans have German ancestry than any other nationality. The German-American Heritage Center still puts a German accent on such celebrations as upcoming Advent and Christmas displays made by children. 
