Meet Rotary Exchange student J.R. Pourin and sample French pastries

(Jean-Romain) Pourin**, 16, is from France’s southwestern wine region of Bordeaux. This year, he’s a student at Pleasant Valley High School and is

living, through Thanksgiving, with **Harry and Susan Coin**. At next week’s meeting, J.R. will present “an engaging audio/video talk about the entire youth exchange experience,” Harry said. After his presentation, he’ll answer as many members’ questions as possible, Harry added.

In addition, Harry informs us, “J.R. will make some desserts, a bakery confection known best in his home region called ‘caneles’ [also known as French rum and vanilla cakes]. They’re fresh out of the oven. He’s asking for our donations to support his Rotary bus trip around the country next spring.”

‘Teamability’ in chaplain’s life

Col. Jeffrey L. Zust, command chaplain of First Army at the Rock Island Arsenal, has been an Army chaplain for 22 years – seeing service and sharing his ministry in various command offices, in the midst of combat and as a student at the National Defense University for top officers of all services.





At the Nov. 9 **Veterans Day special meeting**, he shared some experiences, insights and the definition of a new word for nearly everyone else in the room: “teamability.” “It’s a Special Forces term,” he explained. “It means the ability to lead... and to follow. More than that, it’s the ability every service member must have, ‘to die on command,’ that is, go where he or she is needed anywhere in the world.”

For Jeffrey, that “anywhere” has included Airborne Jump School – when he was 40 years old. “As the highest ranking member of the class,” he said, “I was automatically the unit commander – and that meant I would be first out the door when we did our first airborne jump.”

He suspended his story at that point – standing at the open door with the jump master at his shoulder – as he further elaborated on his theme. (Being a chaplain, he wove a reference to the leadership of King David of ancient Israel, as recorded by the prophet Samuel, into his narrative. Emphasizing the responsibility of leadership, he said, “My whims as a leader are the life’s blood of my people.”)

Jeffrey went on to say, “Abraham Lincoln gave perhaps the greatest

Veterans Day speech (although the holiday didn’t exist yet), when he spoke at Gettysburg of the sacrifices of those who died there.”

In continuing the “teamability” theme, he spoke of the commitment of service members from the past, present and future. And he did return his audience to earth at the end of his first parachute jump from a plane – falling at 17 feet-per-second when he hit the ground.

To conclude his Veterans Day remarks, Jeffrey again quoted Lincoln – this time, from his Second Inaugural address: “...With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan...”

The money raised that way will actually be a donation to J.R.'s host club, the Iowa Quad Cities Rotary, Harry explained. They will use it to defray J.R.'s bus-trip costs.

If you need any more incentive to attend and purchase what Harry describes as “fancy French pastries,” J.R. will use authentic French “ingredients sent from home” to prepare them. They’ll be available to be part of the lunch part of the meeting.

In addition to his sponsorship by the Iowa QC Rotary, J.R. is being supported by Rotary District 6000 Youth Exchange Leader Doug Petersen of that club. After Thanksgiving, J.R. will move from the Coins to the Petersens’ home. He’ll finish his time here with the Dollenbachers, another Iowa QC Rotary family, Harry said.

As part of the preparation for next week’s meeting, Harry provided some answers to the question, what is a Rotary Youth Exchange?

Youth Exchange is a study-abroad opportunity for young people who spend anywhere from a few weeks to a full year as an international student hosted by local Rotary clubs.

It is the opportunity of a lifetime for the more than 8,000 students, ages 15-19, who participate each year. By sharing their own culture and embracing a new one, youth help foster global understanding — and learn a great deal about themselves and their home country in the process.

Exchanges are for students who:

- Have demonstrated leadership in their school and community
- Are flexible and willing to try new things
- Are open to cultural differences
- Can serve as an ambassador for their own country

Come to the meeting and bring your appetites for French pastries and cultural exchange.
