

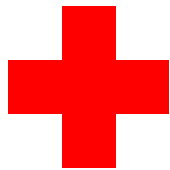

Update what you know about the QC Red Cross

The scheduled speaker for the March 29 meeting is **Amber Wood**, executive director of the American Red Cross serving the Quad Cities and west central Illinois.

Amber has been with the Red Cross since 2008 when she became a community chapter executive in Clinton, Iowa. Over the next five years she also took on management duties at Red Cross offices in Rock Falls, Ill., and Dubuque, Iowa.

In October 2014, Amber was named executive director for a newly formed Red Cross unit serving the Quad Cities and west central Illinois, a 19-county area that also serves northeast Missouri.

Amber has a Bachelor of Science in communications technology management from the University of Wisconsin-Platteville and a Masters of Arts in organizational management from Ashford University. She is a Davenport Rotarian.

Tips for upping your home safety

Shane Peitscher, an 8-year veteran of the Bettendorf Fire Department, knows many ways to make the home safer, and he passed along many of them at the March 22 meeting. While fire safety is the centerpiece of his profession, Shane included two other types of household hazards – falls and poisoning – in his discussion of accident prevention. The top five causes of fatalities in the home,

he reported, are falls, poisoning, fires, choking and water.

Falls: Shane outlined the most effective ways to prevent falls in the home:

- Remove trip hazards, such as loose rugs or clutter, especially in walkways
- Install support bars in shower stalls and at bathtubs
- Make sure stairways, and even a few steps, have railings
- Improve lighting throughout the home



- Use a ladder safely – for example, make sure it's in good condition, wear non-slip footwear, keep your body centered and do not reach beyond an arm's length from that position. [For more tips, see:

Poison prevention: Shane offered these guidelines:

- Keep medicines in their original bottles
- Get rid of unused drugs
- Keep prescriptions in a safe (locked?) place, especially away from small children
- Keep household chemicals in their original container, or clearly labeled
- Never mix chemicals – *especially* bleach and ammonia
- Store chemicals where small children can't find them – preferably, locked away
- Only use chemicals where there's plenty of fresh air

Fire prevention: Since more fires start in the kitchen than in any other room, Shane advised:

- Keep a fire extinguisher, easily accessible, near cooking areas

- Make sure it hasn't reached its expiration date. If it has expired, replace it, and, Shane said later, bring the old one to any Bettendorf fire station
- Install a smoke detector and keep it in working order
- Keep baking soda handy – it will safely smother a grease fire

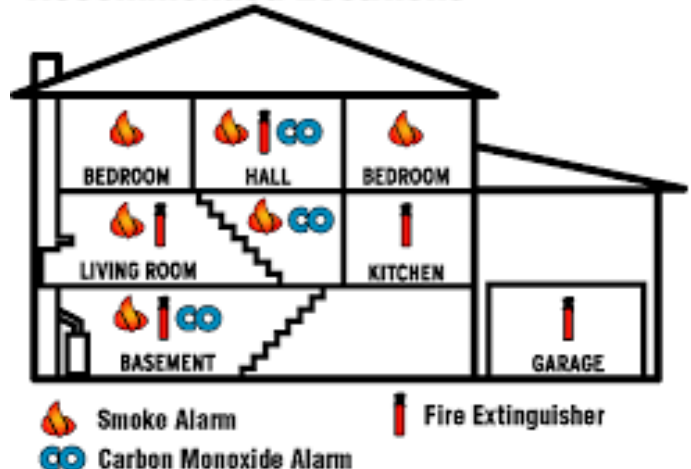
Because heating often causes fire during cold weather, Shane said:

- Keep space heaters in proper condition and at least 3 feet from anything flammable
- Never use a space heater overnight
- Keep flammables away from a fireplace
- Clean the fireplace chimney every year
- Keep all storage at least 3 feet from a water heater

In the laundry room, to prevent a dryer fire, Shane advised:

- Make sure it has been installed by a professional
- Clean lint from the lint trap after each use, and clear lint regularly from the exhaust

Smoke detectors: About 21% of home fires occur in houses where a smoke detector is not working, Shane warned. The National Fire Protection Association,

he pointed out, recommends homes should have smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement. Each bedroom should have two exits, he added – the door and a window. For added home safety, he also recommended:

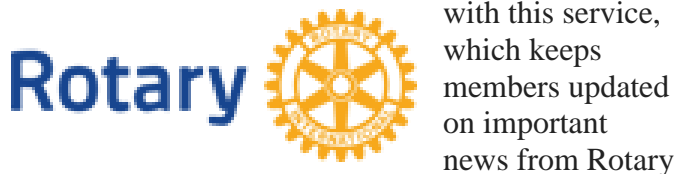
- A carbon monoxide detector
- A fire emergency plan, that every family member knows and practices
- And knowing where and how to shut off the house’s water and electric feeds

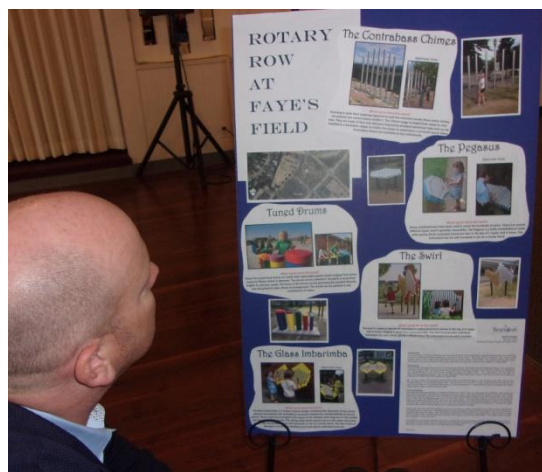

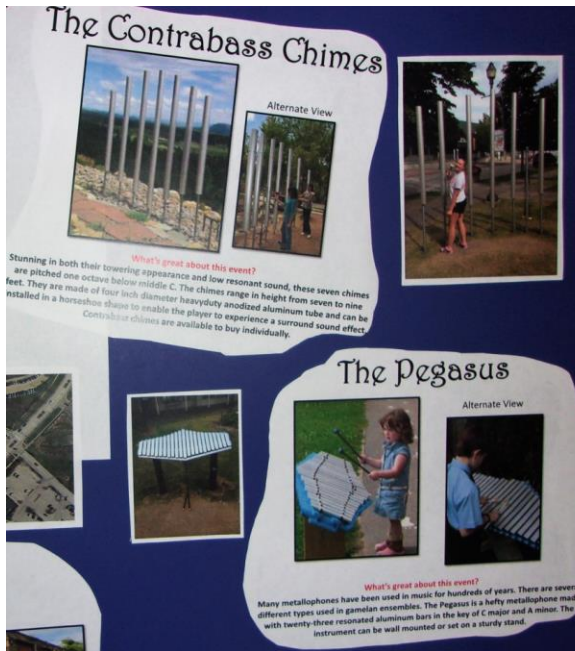
