Scott Community College revs up for annual BASH

Working hard at Braking Traffick

Human trafficking is a form of modernday slavery that most often takes the form of either forced labor or forced sex, said **Kelly Saul**, community outreach advocate for Braking Traffik, a program of Family Resources of the Quad-Cities, at our Aug. 15 meeting.

Human trafficking of both forms especially concern the Quad Cities because of our location along Interstate 80. Both crimes – felonies in both Iowa and Illinois – involve threats of force, fraud or coercion – or actual violence – to compel victims against their will. Braking Traffik has served 97 victims of the crime since 2016, when it merged with Family Resources of the QC. More than half of them have been 18 years old or younger, Kelly said.

She said human trafficking can happen to anybody at any time, and only through

awareness and education, communities locally and across the country can do a better job of identifying the problem and helping victims.

Labor trafficking "can happen in many industries," Kelly said, but most often in agriculture, domestic service, roadside begging and door-to-door sales. She differentiated between trafficking – "the selling of the person for money against their will" – and smuggling – "crossing a border illegally."

Labor trafficking can be interrelated with sex trafficking, she said, in such settings as "Asian massage parlors and domestic servant work."



While sex trafficking most often results in various forms of prostitution, Kelly said its criminal perpetrators may also force victims into pornography or stripping as well.

Those who commit human trafficking crimes "are very smart," she said.
They're very good at "befriending" victims – often through the Internet – to lure them into personal contact, when they are abducted. Teens, who may feel alienated at school or home or both, are especially vulnerable.

Kelly showed a video that Braking Traffik shows to middle and high school groups that uses young Iowa women victims of trafficking. It included the phone number of the national trafficking hotline: 888-3737-888.

Braking Traffik was founded by Maggie Tinsman in 2008. In 2011, the nonprofit began growing under the leadership of Cathy O'Keefe, and merged into Family Resources in 2016.
