Cancer journey... a legacy of help


The guest speaker at BRC's Oct. 7 meeting was **Diane Koster**, who has self-published a book about the journey of her daughter, Lindsay Thul, as she battled a rare form of breast cancer. That presentation was not audible on the Zoom connection, so what follows are excerpts from Website and book-jacket descriptions of "Lindsay's Legacy: A Mother's Memories."

"Lindsay Marie Thul was diagnosed with inflammatory breast cancer (IBC) at the

young age of 28. She died 10 short months later. Lindsay documented her caner journey through a series of online posts, keeping friends and family informed and educated along the way. Her mother... has taken those posts and added her perspective surrounding each step of Lindsay's cancer journey, as a mom and primary caregiver....

"Educating herself about her disease... became her primary mission and focus. Understanding that this form of breast cancer is the rarest and most aggressive type only ignited her desire to exhaust every option available...

"Lindsay documented her experience to give other women information and hope. By sharing her journey... her courage... Lindsay created her legacy.



Lindsay had hope for the future, and she would want other women to have the means to hope for survival. Through multiple fundraising initiatives, Lindsay's family has funds available that will help women with financial barriers get prompt, expert medical attention required to diagnose and treat... IBC. Lindsay's Legacy Fund was established in April

2020 and is held at the Genesis Health Services Foundation.... 100% of the book proceeds go into ... Lindsay's Legacy Fund."

The Rotary Foundation Minute...

Welcome to Week 1 of October, the Economic and Community Development Month of Rotary International.

TRF supports disaster relief and recovery efforts through grants from the Rotary Disaster Response Fund. These District Grants (DG), termed Community Service Grants, are block grants to a Rotary International district. They are used to support short-term projects to help solve humanitarian concerns within a specific community initiated by clubs in that district.

Over two months ago, a Derecho pounded parts of the Midwest, leaving miles of overwhelming destruction across eastern Nebraska and across the middle of Iowa from the Missouri to the Mississippi River. Some cities within District 6000 got help from their Rotarian

neighbors when the District 6000 Disaster Response Committee allocated \$5,000 toward recovery efforts. TRF has added \$25,000 for Derecho relief, especially in Cedar Rapids, Iowa City and Dubuque. As part of its goals to improve literacy, TRF matched a \$5,800 Rotary Club of Cleveland Noonday grant for the Raider Reader Program in the City of Cleveland Schools. The \$11,600 will provide every first- and second-grade student with a book to take home and keep before each of the five extended breaks (fall, Thanksgiving, winter, spring and summer). Carolyn Ingram, a member of the Noonday Rotary Club, said, "This program is one of the best things that we have done to promote literacy in our schools. I am thrilled to be a part of it."
