Learn about device that aids some heart patients

Dr. Helbert Acosta specializes in



cardiology and electrophysiology as a member of the Genesis Heart Institute. As our guest speaker at the Nov. 10 meeting, he will tell us about the Watchman FLX device, which the manufacturer's Website says is inserted during "a one-time, minimally invasive procedure for

people with atrial fibrillation not caused by a heart valve problem..., who need an alternative to blood thinners."

After earning his medical degree at the Universidad Del Valle in Colombia, Dr. Acosta completed residency in internal medicine at Miami University and fellowships in cardiology at Oklahoma University Hospital and State University of New York at Buffalo.

Foundation funds Rotary projects

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is "to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty." At our Nov. 3 meeting, Past District 6000 Gov. Chris Knapp, who is the district's Foundation Chair, brought those words to life as he explained how the Foundation does its work – and how each of us can support that work.

He began by explaining that the money donated this year isn't immediately available to fund projects – it's invested for two years, after which half of it becomes available to districts to fund grants that support projects.

Chris explained that District 6000 makes all of the funds it receives available to clubs in the district to fund projects in their community. In recent years, BRC has used such grants to support the work of a number of non-profits in the QC.

All TRF grants, whether to support local, district or international projects, must be

used to support one of Rotary's seven areas of focus, he said:

- → Peace and conflict prevention and resolution
- →Disease prevention and treatment
- →Water and sanitation
- → Maternal and child health
- →Basic education and literacy
- →Economic and community development
- →Supporting the environment.

Chris described how Rotary's Global Grants "support large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes." Global Grants are a partnership among individual clubs, districts and the Foundation. They need to address an important community need and have a minimum budget of \$30,000. He outlined two examples of Global Grants involving Iowa Rotary clubs:

For the last seven years, District 6000 and many of its clubs have been part of the Rotary Action Group for Clubfoot, which trains orthopedic surgeons to use the Ponseti Method of correcting clubfoot in young children. Since 2016 RAG4Clubfoot has trained 152 surgeons from South America and the Caribbean using more than \$525,000 in Global Grant funds. They have treated some 152,000 patients in that time – at a cost-per-patient of only \$3.46, Chris said.

Meanwhile, he said a Rotary club in Tanzania saw the need to provide fresh water to some remote villages in its area. It researched the issue, wrote a proposal and put out a request for Rotary partners – and a club in Ames joined in.

[A few years ago, BRC spearheaded a similar project: A member originally from Haiti proposed and researched a project to collect rainwater from roofs in a village and store it in cisterns, saving

villagers from making daily multi-hour trips for fresh water. Bettendorf members recruited other Iowa clubs, plus clubs in the Chicago area, elsewhere in the U.S. and many places in the Caribbean.]

Chris went on to describe "Ways to Give" – as an annual or sustaining donor, becoming a major donor or including the Foundation in estate planning. BRC structures its dues so every member donates \$100 per year to the Paul Harris Fellowship – and matches those contributions until they reach \$1,000, when the member becomes part of the Paul Harris Society.

President Larry Thein said the club has budgeted to give out 25 baskets, and he will contact the Bettendorf Police social worker for more names — or extend our support to LeClaire for families there. Mike Ingleby invited members to give him names of families that could benefit from a basket. The Thanksgiving food basket delivery will be on Saturday, Nov. 20.

In the spirit of giving, Mike suggested a work day when Rotarians could do yard work for those who can't do it themselves – and **Decker Ploehn** said he should check with the BPD social worker for any referrals.

... of the meeting today, Beth Clark won the drawing for a free make-up from among the names of members who shared their news in today's installment of "BRC Happy \$\$ Plus."


